Students were eager to share their holiday experiences when returning to school for Term 3!

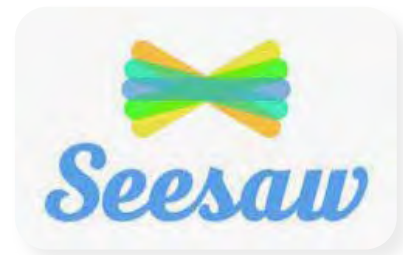
They created trioramas of a scene from their holidays and wrote a short passage to match. Here are some of their examples.

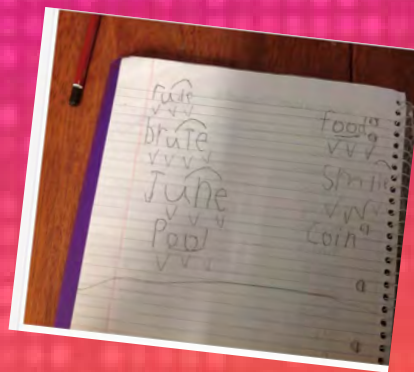
Although we were in lockdown, it was great to see many students engage in our learning online using Seesaw.

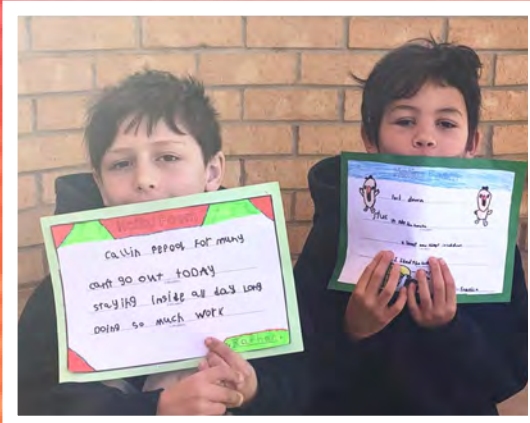

STARTING SECONDARY SCHOOL

IN 2022



This term enrolment offers for secondary school will be sent to the families of our year 6 and 7 students. It is important for you to know that not all schools will send out their enrolment offers at the same time, but they will be sent as close as possible to 13 August 2021.

Most families will receive their offer via email. If you think you have not received your enrolment offer from your secondary school, you need to check your junk folder for an email from education.noreply@sa.gov.au.

If you did not provide an email address on your Registration of Interest form, you will receive your enrolment offer in the mail or it will be handed to you by your child.

If your enrolment offer has not arrived by 18 August, please let the school's front office know and we can follow up with the secondary school on your behalf.

If you need support to accept your enrolment offer, it is best to contact your allocated secondary school and they can step you through the process.

How old do you have to be to use Snapchat?



Snapchat's terms of service state that users must be 13 years of age. Users have to enter their birth date to set up an account, but there is no age verification. This makes it easy for children under 13 to sign up. Common Sense Media rates Snapchat OK for teens 16 and up, mainly because there can be exposure to age-inappropriate content and marketing ploys, such as quizzes, that collect data.
